

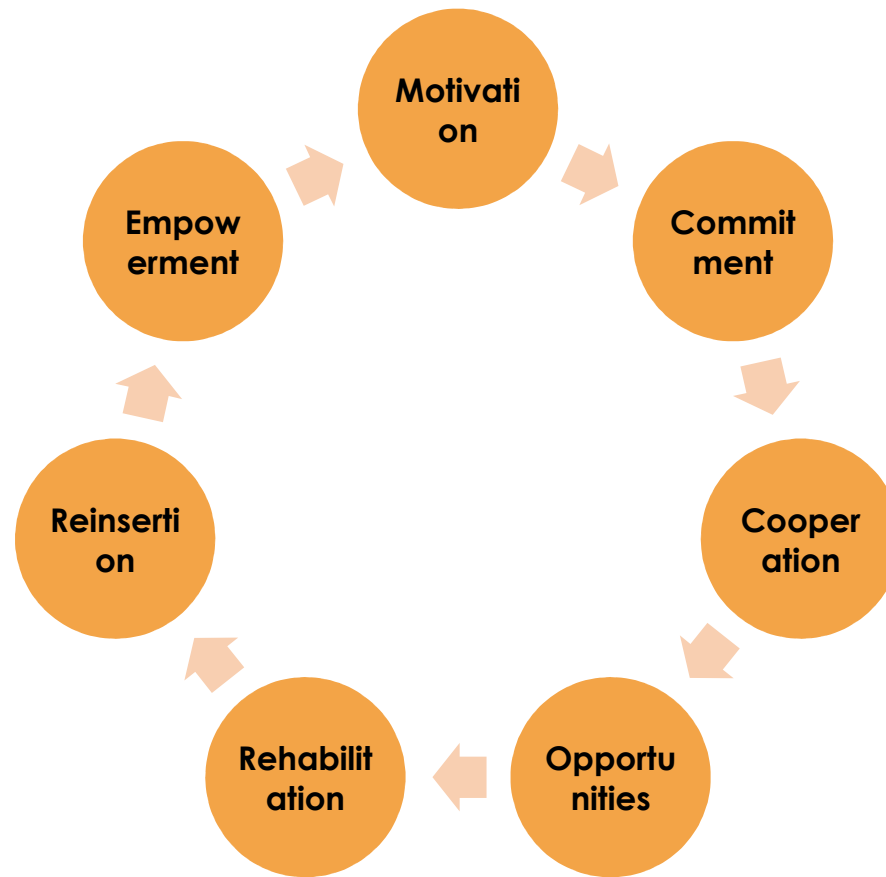

# Suggestions for practitioners

- Stimulate prisoners' motivation and commitment to a treatment path
- Inform prisoners about the possible treatment services
- Work towards a standardized procedure for diagnostic and therapeutic assessment and an integrated and unified national follow up mechanism.
- Strengthen bonds between organizations and institutional actors
- Improve services offered to inmates
- Invest in an active and engaging therapeutic response
- Rehabilitation and social reintegration go hand in hand

# Suggestions for policy makers

## ► At **policy level**

- Prison in general, is not the place to treat addiction. There are possibility's in special drug free prisons or drug free departments in general prisons.
- Invest in alternative solutions; avoid drug addicts entering prison
- Invest in services in prison already working towards rehabilitation
- Build up/ strengthen partnership between justice and health care system
- Alternative measures work best with a multidisciplinary staff
- Have a look at good examples like Drug Treatment Courts
- Invest in evaluation

## ► At **grass root level**

- Create a synergie among the judiciary system, the health care system and the non profit organizations; strengthen bonds
- Invest in 1) adequate funding for alternatives to incarceration and 2) treatment
